

The Internet also allows us to learn about anything, talk to people at any time (no matter where they are in the world), and share our knowledge and creative projects with others.







10 Rules of Cyber-Safety





















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Rule #1

Always solve problems face-to-face with the person you are having the problem with.



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Rule #2

Assume that the messages you send can be read by everyone and anyone.

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Rule #3

If you are ever bullied or see someone else being bullied, talk to a trusted adult right away. Report it!

Rule #4

Keep your accounts and sites private. Don't share your password.





Rule #5

Don't give out any personal information: age, school, location, male or female, etc



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Rule #6

Never post or share anything you don't want the whole world to see and have access to forever!





















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Rule #7

Never make a threat on social media or the internet, even as a joke.





















Rule #8

Save or print out any threats you see or receive and show them to a trusted adult right away. Report them!

























Rule #9

If someone says or posts something that makes you uncomfortable, sign off. Block the person and report them to the site.



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Rule #10

Never met anyone in the real world that you first met online without a safety plan approved by your parents.
